



## Summer 2021 Survey Results for CCSESA

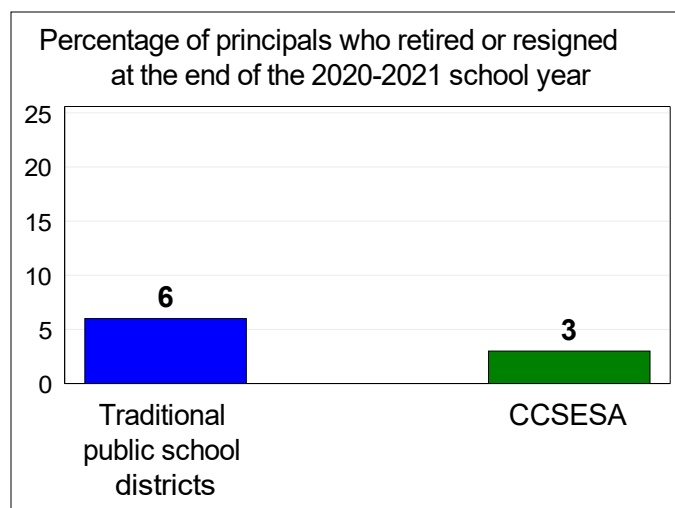
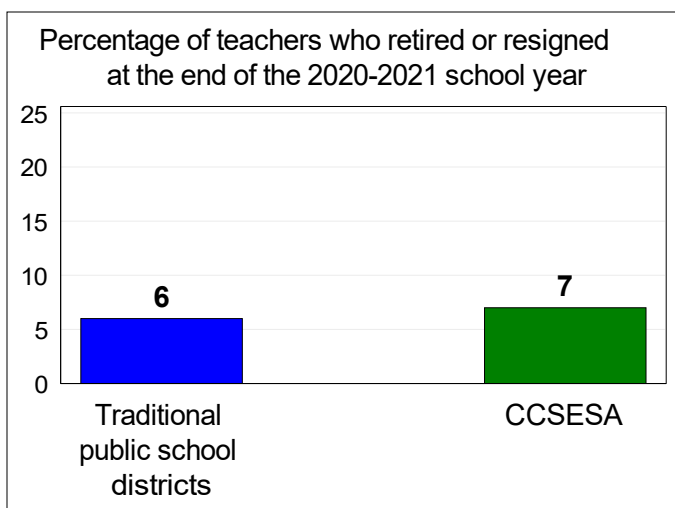
This report provides responses to the ASDP summer survey, fielded June 1 through July 2, 2021. We created this report exclusively for your organization's use; we will not release it publicly nor share it with any other organization.

### How to read this report

- In the pages that follow, we list the results for every close-ended question on the summer 2021 survey.
- We weighted the results to be nationally representative of traditional U.S. school districts.
- Throughout this report, the term "Traditional public school districts" includes responses from all traditional public school districts that took the survey; it does not include responses from CMOs.
- In addition to weighted national results, you will see results for California. A total of 37 school districts in California responded to the survey. Note that the ASDP sample was created to be nationally representative; results at other levels of aggregation are not representative.

### Selected highlights

A total of 292 district leaders took the summer 2021 survey, including 277 from traditional public school districts and 15 from charter management organizations.
