Cal. Educ. Code § 33126.1(c)(2). Please note that school districts are not required to use the standardized template but must report data in a manner that is consistent with the data definitions. Ed Code § 33126.1(j).

#### **SARC Requirements:**

33126(b) The school accountability report card shall include, but is not limited to, assessment of the following school conditions:

- **(6)(A)** Quality and currency of textbooks and other instructional materials, including whether textbooks and other materials meet state standards and are adopted by the state board for kindergarten and grades 1 to 8, inclusive, and adopted by the governing boards of school districts for grades 9 to 12, inclusive, and the ratio of textbooks per pupil and the year the textbooks were adopted.

- (iii) Science laboratory equipment for grades 9 to 12, inclusive, as appropriate.
- (iv) Visual and performing arts.

**33126(b)(8)** Safety, cleanliness, and adequacy of school facilities, including any needed maintenance to ensure good repair as specified in Section 17014, Section 17032.5, subdivision (a) of Section 17070.75, and subdivision (b) of Section 17089.

- **33126.1(a)** The department shall develop and recommend for adoption by the state board a standardized template intended to simplify the process for completing the school accountability report card and make the school accountability report card more meaningful to the public.
  - **(c)** When the template for a school is completed, it should enable parents and guardians to compare the manner in which local schools compare to other schools within that district as well as other schools in the state.
  - (g) The state board shall approve available definitions for inclusion in the template as well as a timetable for the further development of definitions and data collection procedures. Each year the state board shall adopt the template for the current year's school accountability report card. Definitions for all school conditions shall be included in the template.
  - (j) A school or school district that chooses not to use the standardized template adopted pursuant to this section shall report the data for its school accountability report card in a manner that is consistent with the definitions adopted pursuant to subdivision (c).
