

## OLWEUS BULLYING PREVENTION PROGRAM COMPONENTS





#### 2012 Olweus Survey

- Fewer students reported being bullied on playground
- 37% improvement in rates of physical fights on school campus among 7<sup>th</sup> graders
- More students helped a student who was bullied
- More students told an adult when they have been bullied



## CHKS RESULTS FOR SITES THAT HAVE BEEN TRAINED IN SECOND STEP



Student Harassment on School Campuses Outcomes:

- Improvement was noted for all three grade levels
  - -35% less for 7<sup>th</sup> graders
  - -34% less for 9<sup>th</sup> graders
  - -29% less for 11<sup>th</sup> graders

## SERVICES FOR MOST AT-RISK



- Aggression Replacement Training (ART)
   Counselors, Probation
   Officers, SRO's trained
- Reconnecting Youth
- Girls Circle, Boy's Council (MS/HS)

SCHOOL BASED SERVICES FOR MOST AT RISK YOUTH PROVIDED BY COMMUNITY RECOVERY RESOURCES Multiple school-based interventions around youth substance use and abuse

- -Drug Diversion program on school-site
- -KIDS (Keep it Direct and Simple)
- Average of 422 students served per year
- 332 students have completed their contract
- In addition, 61 went on to a higher level of care
- On average, only 7% of program graduates reoffend. This year, down to 3%

# **SERVICES FOR AT-RISK**

**G.R.E.A.T. Program** Evidence based Gang Resistance, Education & Training Program

- Our Initial goal:
  - Reduce the percentage of 7<sup>th</sup>, 9<sup>th</sup> & 11<sup>th</sup> graders who report that they consider themselves a member of a gang by 30%





Overall reduction in the Percentage of Students Reporting Gang Membership Between 2009 and 2013


- 38% decrease for 7<sup>th</sup> grade
- 13% decrease for 9<sup>th</sup> grade
- 43% decrease for 11<sup>th</sup> grade

## Early Childhood Social and Emotional Learning Programs

#### Needs and gaps in 2009

- Ineffective parenting skills and lack of programs to address need
- Only 44% of preshool-age children attended a preschool
- -Children were expelled from preschool 3 times the rate as children in elementary grades
- Delayed social and emotional development

## PARENTING CLASSES



**Triple P Parenting** is an evidencebased system of parenting interventions for families with children 2-12 years.

## Second Step Prevention Early Intervention



#### **Collaborative Program:** SECOND STEP Curriculum into preschools of the Western Nevada County Region as a component of the County's MHSA Prevention and Early Intervention (PEI) Plan.

#### Accomplishments

- 22 sites currently using the program that have been trained in 2012-13
- 9 State Preschools and five Head Start Head Start Centers are now using Second Step.

## MENTAL HEALTH ACTIVITIES

- Student Assistance Program SAP teams implemented at MS/HS and trained to identify and refer students that exhibit at-risk behaviors
- NC Behavioral Health provides on-side individual and group services for students and families.
- Crisis Intervention Therapist





### **School Based Behavioral Health** Services The number of students who received schoolbased mental health services increased by 203% between 2009/10 and 2011/12

#### SUICIDE IS A HUGE ISSUE IN RURAL COUNTIES

 18% of 7<sup>th</sup> grade and 17% of 9<sup>th</sup> grade and 16% of 11<sup>th</sup> grade students reported seriously considered attempting suicide, past 12 months

#### SOURCES OF STRENGTH




